May 1, 2021 General Election

The City of Hurst will hold a General Election to elect persons to fill the offices of City Council Place 1, 2 and 6.

The Saturday May 1, 2021 Election Day Polling Place will be at the Brookside Center, 1244 Brookside Drive, Hurst, Texas, and will be open 7 a.m. – 7 p.m. Registered voters may also vote at any Tarrant County polling location.

Early voting by personal appearance will begin on April 19, 2021 and will end on April 27, 2021. Hours designated for early voting by personal appearance:

April 24 | Saturday | 7 a.m. – 7 p.m.

Fight the Bite

Tips to reduce the mosquito population

Controlling mosquito populations and reducing the risk for West Nile virus, Zika Virus and Chikungunya Viruses must be done on several fronts—education and prevention are at the forefront of those efforts. As we head into mosquito season, it's imperative that residents take steps to protect themselves and control mosquito populations at home.

The most important thing citizens can do to reduce the risk of exposure to West Nile virus is to eliminate mosquito-breeding areas around the home and limit exposure to feeding mosquitoes. Many female mosquitoes can lay 100-300 eggs on the surface of fresh or stagnant water every third night during its life span. Here are some simple things citizens can do to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites around the home:

1. Do not allow water to accumulate in saucers of flowerpots, cemetery urns, or in pet dishes for more than two days.
2. Get rid of tin cans, old tires, buckets, unused plastic swimming pools, or other containers that collect and hold water.
3. Clean debris from rain gutters, remove standing water from flat roofs, and repair leaks around faucets and air conditioners.

4. Change the water in birdbaths and wading pools at least once a week.
5. Fill or drain puddles, ditches and swampy areas.
6. Check for trapped water in plastic or canvas tarps used to cover boats or pools, and arrange the tarp to drain the water.

Follow the Four Ds

1. Use insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.
2. DRESS in long sleeves and long pants when you are outside.
3. Stay indoors at DUSK and DAWN, when mosquitoes are most active.
4. DRAIN standing water where mosquitoes breed. Common breeding sites include old tires, flowerpots and clogged rain gutters.

Spring will be here before we know it along with West Nile Virus. When Hurst sprays to kill mosquitos, we notify the area using our CodeRed Notification System. If you would like to be on that list, please sign up at hursttx.gov/codered. For more information about mosquito control and management, visit hursttx.gov/fightthebite.

New Online Self-Service Planning, Permitting and Licensing

We recently launched a new EnerGov™ Citizen Self-Service Portal that will allow customers to submit development applications and documentation, renew business licenses, pay fees, check the status of applications, view inspections, and complete a host of additional Planning and Development Services related business processes with the City.

To begin using the new system, customers will visit hursttx.gov/css and create a login profile to register. The EnerGov™ Citizen Self-Service portal will guide users step by step through the application process online, allow them to submit necessary documentation and pay fees associated with their submittal, and manage multiple applications in one

online destination. The system will automatically route materials to the proper City departments for review and allow the applicant to track the progress of their submittal. Along with the ability to apply and manage submittals, the ability to make online payments eliminates the need to mail in or deliver checks or other documentation in person.

As part of city council's strategic priority, Innovation, EnerGov™ will allow staff to enhance efficiency while focusing on process improvement and customer service.

Let us help you with your spring-cleaning by bringing your household hazardous waste to the Service Center along with an ID and Hurst water bill.

Accepted Items:

Automotive fluids, batteries, cleaners & degreasers, cooking oil, lawn/garden/pool chemicals, light bulbs, and paint. There is a limit on paint of three five-gallon containers.

Items Not Accepted:

Ammunition or explosives, appliances or electronics, building materials, bulk trash and yard waste, butane or propane cylinders, medicines or sharps, and tires.

Document shredding will be available. Three (3) box limit, no larger than 15"x12"x10" accepted. Limited space. First come, first served.

PROPERTY PRIDE

Seasonal Property Maintenance Award

- Anyone can nominate a property in Hurst!
- Only residential properties in the City of Hurst are eligible for the award.
- Four properties per season will be chosen by Neighborhood Services.
- Nominations should be made for overall property maintenance including, but not limited to, painting and landscaping.
- Winning properties will receive a yard display and could be featured on the city website.
- Properties are eligible to receive the award once every 3 years.

FLOODPLAIN Planning

The City of Hurst participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and the Community Rating System (CRS). Basic homeowner's insurance policies don't cover damage from floods. Federally subsidized flood insurance is available to all city residents. Due to the City's efforts to minimize the loss of life and property related to flooding events, residents receive discounted insurance premiums. Properties in the City of Hurst that are located in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) are eligible for a 10% discount on flood insurance, and those located outside the SFHA are eligible for a 5% discount. Should you have questions about our community's Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM), potential unique flood risks to your property, flood depth projections, or historical flood information on record, consider giving us a call. We can also provide information on functions of natural floodplains, ways to protect your property from flood damage, types of protection measures, and provide sources of financial assistance for implementing flood protection measures. Storm Water Runoff

The City of Hurst maintains a storm drain system designed to remove stormwater run-off to the nearest body of water. Stormwater begins as rain and washes over both pervious (grass, woodlands, gardens, and other undeveloped lands) and impervious surfaces (roofs, driveways, parking lots, streets, and other hard surfaces). Runoff is created from excess water that cannot be absorbed and enters the city's stormwater drainage system. As it flows, runoff collects and transports pet waste, soil, pesticides, fertilizers, oil and grease, litter and other pollutants.

If these materials enter the storm drain system, they flow directly to our waterways untreated.

Tips for Keeping Stormwater Clean

- Never dump anything into the storm drain system.
- Use native or adaptive landscaping. Visit www.txsmartscape.com for examples.
- Recycle yard waste by mulching or composting.
- Pump pool water into the sanitary sewer system, not into the street or storm drain.
- Let your roof water your yard. Direct downspouts away from paved areas.
- Use biodegradable soap when washing your car at home and wash it on your lawn; better yet, take your car to a professional car wash.
- Pick up after and bag your pet's waste.
- If you change your car's oil, don't dump it on the ground or in the storm drain; dispose of it properly at an oil-recycling center.

Through a partnership with Tarrant County and other area cities, we have worked together to open the Northeast Tarrant County Clinic at the Hurst Conference Center as a way to assist Tarrant County in providing more COVID-19 vaccinations to individuals. Volunteers from each city involved have been doing temperature checks, assisting with registration, parking, and more to ensure things run smoothly. Fire personnel have been administering the vaccinations and monitoring people after they receive it. Thanks to all these volunteers, we are able to administer more than 2,000 vaccinations each day.

Healthy Hurst Wellness Program

The Healthy Hurst initiative was created in 2006 as a way for Hurst citizens to track their exercise goals. Over the past 15 years, the program has evolved into a health initiative representing the varying external forces contributing to a balanced lifestyle. To convey this idea in a visual format, the Parks and Recreation Team created the Healthy Hurst logo composed of five different symbols. The logo seeks to represent everything about Hurst that contributes to a synergy between community and individual. The symbols, which portray sunshine (sun), nature (leaf), physical activity (bike), and social events (music note), surround a vibrant, healthy heart. The colors orange, green, yellow,

and blue represent the four seasons and the city's pledge to promote positive health throughout the year. As the slogan at the bottom states, the ultimate goal is to "Feel Good & Live Well."
