



# City growing strong as 59 new businesses open doors in first six months of 2021

It might sound odd to say that commercial real estate activity has been strong with the blistering effects of the pandemic still looming but that was the case in the first half of this year in the City of Hurst. Fifty-nine new businesses totaling 136,630 sq. ft. opened in Hurst in the first six months of this year. And even more exciting was that the most popular new store category of all, new restaurants, blossomed during that time. Eleven new restaurants opened in Hurst. Several have recently opened their doors including Hattie Marie's Texas BBQ, Cajun Kitchen, Dixie House Café and Hawaiian Bros Island Grill. Hawaiian Bros is introducing their brand and Hawaiian cuisine to the DFW market in a big way, as Hurst was their second location, and they have numerous others planned. It's a great place to find authentic Island comfort food plates including Honolulu Chicken and Luau Pig.

North East Mall continues its recovery from the pandemic slowdown, as traffic returns to brick and mortar stores, and builds to pre-pandemic levels. New retailers have joined the fine roster with exciting new products like World Axe Games, Dallas Cowboys Pro Shop, Tastebud's Live and Quicklotz

Liquidation. Quicklotz has just opened Texas' largest, innovative "bin shopping experience" there with over 50,000 items of electronics, housewares, clothes, furniture and crafts at up to 90 percent off retail.

In November 2020, Hurst voters supported the legal sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption. Retailers quickly began to fill this newly created market segment in Hurst. Tarrant Liquor and Fossil Creek Wine and Spirits have now opened and Liquorland and Spec's Wine, Spirits and Finer Foods are soon to start construction. We're exicted to announce that Bahama Bucks will be opening next to Liquorland.

New families continue to move to Hurst as over 250 existing single-family homes have been sold in the first six months of 2021. An additional 94 families are now enjoying the new multi-family development, Patriot Place, that opened last month on Hwy 10 at nearly 100 percent leased.

# New Online Self-Service Planning, Permitting and Licensing

We recently launched a new EnerGov<sup>TM</sup> Citizen Self-Service Portal that will allow customers to submit development applications and documentation, renew business licenses, pay fees, check the status of applications, view inspections, and complete a host of additional Planning and Development Services related business processes with the City.

To begin using the new system, customers will visit hursttx.gov/servicerequest and create a login profile to register. The EnerGov<sup>TM</sup> Citizen Self-Service portal will guide users step by step through the application process online, allow them to submit necessary documentation and pay fees associated with their submittal, and manage multiple

applications in one online destination. The system will automatically route materials to the proper City departments for review and allow the applicant to track the progress of their submittal. Along with the ability to apply and manage submittals, the ability to make online payments eliminates the need to mail in or deliver checks or other documentation in person.

As part of city council's strategic priority, Innovation, EnerGov<sup>TM</sup> will allow staff to enhance efficiency while focusing on process improvement and customer service.

# New facility focuses on pet adoption, education, recreation

We recently celebrated the grand opening of the new Animal Services and Adoption Center! Located at 900 TCC Rd., this new facility provides over 16,000 square feet of space for the city's Animal Services Division. In lieu of being simply a traditional animal shelter that mainly houses animals, the new facility will serve as an adoption center that also places a major focus on education. It has the capability of housing 48 dogs, and the housing area is divided into compartments with each compartment containing ten kennels. This allows the staff to separate dogs by size, age, temperament, and personality. Each compartment opens onto a secured outdoor deck that can be used by the public as a meet-and-greet play area with the dogs.

Located adjacent to the main entry is a large housing area for 60 cats. The housing area is designed in a manner that is intended to serve as a display area that encourages the adoption of cats. One of the focal points will be the "cat condo" structure.

The building's lobby is designed to attract and encourage the public to visit the facility. The

lobby has the characteristics and feel of a pet store rather than a traditional institutional looking animal shelter. The facility will not only be used to care for the medical needs of the animals housed but it is also intended to be used by local veterinarians offering public programs and clinics.

The placement of the new Animal Services and Adoption Center gave us an opportunity to add a highly requested dog park to our city!

Located right behind the shelter, the dog park is divided into three fenced paddocks where dogs will enjoy exploring the spacious lawns and custom design features while pet parents rest on benches or stroll the concrete paths. Each one-acre paddock features a double-gated entry, water bowl and bottle filling station, and dog wash station. Creatively repurposed fire hydrants, reflectors and pipes provide enrichment for dogs with playful challenges including weave poles, A-frames, tunnels and jumps. Now open, your furry friends can finally enjoy some 'off-the-leash' playtime right in our own backyard!

# Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Shredding

### October 9

Hurst Service Center | 2001 Precinct Line Rd. | 8 - 11 a.m.

Let us help you with your spring-cleaning by bringing your household hazardous waste to the Service Center along with an ID and Hurst water bill.

### **Accepted Items:**

Automotive fluids, batteries, cleaners & degreasers, cooking oil, lawn/garden/pool chemicals, light bulbs, and paint. There is a limit on paint of three five-gallon containers.

### **Items Not Accepted:**

Ammunition or explosives, appliances or electronics, building materials, bulk trash and yard waste, butane or propane cylinders, medicines or sharps, and tires.

Document shredding will be available. Three (3) box limit, no larger than 15"x12"x10" accepted. Limited space. First come, first served.

If you can't make this event and would like to take your household hazardous waste items to the Environmental Collection Center in Fort Worth, you can find all the details at hurstx.gov/trash.

# Let's talk about

# **GREASE** in the kitchen

### Why Should I Help?

- Prevent grease buildups from blocking sewer
- Stop sewer overflows into streets and storm
- Save money spent on costly cleanups of sewage spills.
- Reduce the number of times you have to clean your grease trap (food services).
- Protect the quality of our water.

### Do:

- Put oil and grease in covered collection containers.
- Scrape food scraps from dishes into trashcans and garbage bags and dispose of properly. Avoid using your garbage disposal.
- Remove oil and grease from dishes, pans, fryers and griddles. Cool first before you skim, scrape or wipe off excess grease.
- Prewash dishes and pans with cold water before putting them into the dishwasher.
- Cover kitchen sink with catch basket and empty into garbage can as needed.

Cover floor drain with fine screen and empty into garbage as needed.

### Don't:

- Don't pour oil and grease down the drain.
- Don't put food scraps down the drain.
- Don't run water over dishes, pans, fryers and griddles to wash oil and grease down the drain. Don't rinse off oil and grease with hot water.

### More ways to tackle grease . . .

- Use environmentally safe cleaning products instead of harsh detergents or cleaners that can damage sewer lines.
- If you generate large amounts of used cooking oil, recycle it. To find a recycler, search "recyclers" or "rendering companies" online.
- If you generate small amounts of used cooking oil, pour it into a container you can throw away. Never pour it down the drain.
- Start a compost pile at your home with scraps that are not meat.

Are you in need of reliable, low-cost transportation to get to job interviews, work or school? If you are transportation disadvantaged, HEB Transit can help. You can travel within the cities of Hurst, Euless and Bedford, and to the Hurst/Bell and Centreport train stations for \$3 per one-way trip, Monday – Friday from 6 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

This service is administered in partnership with Catholic Charities Fort Worth (CCFW)
Transportation Services, and supported by the cities of Hurst, Euless and Bedford, Tarrant County Commissioner Gary Fickes, Christian Connection, 6Stones, Northeast Emergency Distribution (NEED) East, St. John the Apostle Catholic Church, and Mission Central.

CCFW Transportation Services is excited to announce the addition of a mobile app to enhance the customer experience. You must call to book trips, but will be able to view future trips, cancel trips up to two hours before your pick-up, as well as view past trips using the app. In addition, you can track your account balance when taking advantage of the new pre-pay option. Lastly, you will be able to track your driver when they are on the way to pick you up.

# Flood Safety Tips

Texas weather is unpredictable. Know what to do when severe weather occurs, including severe flooding. Here are ways to prepare before a flood occurs and what to do during one.

### **Before the Flood**

### 1. Check with the Engineering Department (817-788-7080) on the extent of past flooding in your area.

 City staff can tell you about the causes of repetitive flooding, what the city is doing about it and what would be an appropriate flood protection level. They can also visit your property to discuss flood protection alternatives.

### 2. Prepare for flooding by doing the following:

- Know how to shut off the electricity and gas to your house when a flood comes.
- Make a list of emergency numbers and identify a safe place to go.
- Make a household inventory and put insurance policies, valuable papers, medicine, etc. in a safe place.
- Report blockages in creeks, culverts, drainage ditches and storm drain inlets by calling Public Works at 817-788-7076.
- Develop a response plan consult the American Red Cross website for information on creating an emergency preparedness plan.
- The American Red Cross has also published the brochure Repairing Your Flooded Home, which provides information on planning and preparing for a flood event as well as repairing after a flood event.

### 3. Consider some permanent flood protection measures.

- Mark your fuse box to show the circuits to the floodable areas.
   Turning off the power to these floodable areas can reduce property damage and save lives.
- Consider flood protection alternatives such as flood walls or berms. Note that some flood protection measures may require permits. Please check with the Engineering Division and/or Building Inspections for more information.
- A copy of Homeowner's Guide to Retrofitting: Six Ways to Protect Your House from Flooding are available at no charge to download from FEMA.

### 4. Talk to the Engineering Division for information on financial assistance.

- If you are interested in obtaining more information on what you can do to prevent flood damage, or what funds may be available to assist you with mitigating flood damage to your property, contact the Engineering Division at 817.788.7080.
- Get a flood insurance policy it will help pay for repairs after a flood and, in some cases, it will help pay the costs of elevating a substantially damaged building.

### 5. Get a flood insurance policy.

- Typically, homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. However, some owners have purchased flood insurance because it was required by the bank when they received a mortgage or home improvement loan.
- Don't wait until the next flood to buy flood insurance protection. In most cases, there is a 30-day waiting period before the National Flood Insurance Program coverage takes effect.
- Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

### **During and After the Flood**

### Check with the Engineering Department (817-788-7080) on the extent of past flooding in your area.

- Do not wade through floodwaters due to the danger of pollutants, debris (nails, glass, etc) and animals (snakes, ants, etc.).
   Floodwaters are often murky and depth is hard to determine.
- Do not drive through floodwaters! Turn around, don't drown! If emergency evacuation is necessary, please heed the warnings of the emergency management and follow the instructions to evacuate - it saves lives of those around you and possibly of the emergency workers responding.
- Ask for a licensed electrician, plumber etc. to check or turn on your power, water and/or gas.

The City of Hurst Public Works Department is a member of the Community Rating System through the National Flood Insurance Program. This information is provided as a resource for residents.

# Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety



Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

### What is your alarm telling you?

### **SMOKE ALARMS**

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call **9-1-1**, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

### **CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS**

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home.
   Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.

• Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

### Some tips:

- Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

Hear a Beep, Get On Your Feet!

Get out and stay out! Call 9-1-1 from outside.

### Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old. If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!

# Ambulance Subscription Service

The City of Hurst is offering citizens an ambulance subscription service to help offset the high costs of emergency ambulance transportation. Insurance companies routinely do not pay the entire amount of ambulance transportation, leaving the patient with the responsibility of paying the balance of the bill. The purpose of the subscription service is to cover the amount not covered by your insurance provider or Medicare. If a person does not have health care insurance, this program covers emergency medical services delivered prior to hospital arrival. For \$60 per year per family, you will never have to worry about paying an ambulance bill. Medicaid Recipients are not eligible for this program.

Ambulance Subscription Service enrollment is going on now through December 31, 2021.

# **Cyber Security Tips**

October is Cyber Security Awareness Month. Here are some helpful tips to stay secure.

### Keep a Clean Machine

**Keep security software current:** Having the latest security software, web browser and operating system is the best defense against viruses, malware and other online threats.

**Automate software updates:** Many software programs will automatically connect and update to defend against known risks. Turn on automatic updates if that's an available option.

**Protect all devices that connect to the Internet:** Along with computers, smartphones, gaming systems and other web-enabled devices also need protection from viruses and malware.

**Plug & scan:** USBs and other external devices can be infected by viruses and malware. Use your security software to scan them.



### **Protect Your Personal Information**

Lock down your login: Fortify your online accounts by enabling the strongest authentication tools available, such as biometrics, security keys or a unique one-time code through an app on your mobile device. Your usernames and passwords are not enough to protect key accounts like email, banking and social media.

Make your password a sentence: A strong password is a sentence that is at least 12 characters long. Focus on positive sentences or phrases that you like to think about and are easy to remember (for example, "I love country music."). On many sites, you can even use spaces!



**Unique account, unique password:** Having separate passwords for every account helps to thwart cybercriminals. At a minimum, separate your work and personal accounts and make sure that your critical accounts have the strongest passwords.

Write it down and keep it safe: Everyone can forget a password. Keep a list that's stored in a safe, secure place away from your computer. You can alternatively use a service like a password manager to keep track of your passwords.

### **Connect With Care**

When in doubt, throw it out: Links in emails, social media posts and online advertising are often how cybercriminals try to steal your personal information. Even if you know the source, if something looks suspicious, delete it.

### Get savvy about Wi-Fi

hotspots: Limit the type of business you conduct and adjust the security settings on your device to limit who can access your machine.

Protect your \$\$: When banking and shopping, check to be sure the site is security enabled. Look for web addresses with "https://" or "shttp://," which means the site takes extra measures to help secure your information. "Http://" is not secure.






