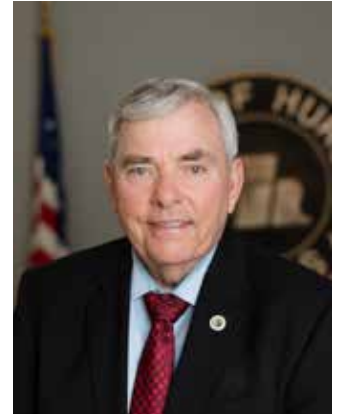

Survey offers residents input on City's budget priorities

Each year, the City of Hurst engages in our Strategic Planning Process to determine priorities for the upcoming budget. This process allows the city council to evaluate community needs and assess their impact on the city's budget while also helping the city determine which services to provide and at what level they are offered. One critical factor that affects the strategic planning process is our annual citizen survey.

We will open up our survey for responses during the month of January. You'll be able to access it during that time by visiting hursttx.gov/citizensurvey. Once the survey is closed, staff and council will

evaluate how responses have changed over the past year to effectively develop a strategic plan to guide the budget process. These survey results are direct feedback and information that is critical to developing council's priorities that staff uses to develop the proposed budget.

We are excited about the opportunity to continue to provide high quality services to our citizens. We sincerely appreciate all who have responded to our surveys now and in the past. The responses we receive help us develop a budget that meets the needs of our community today and tomorrow.



City app puts services at fingertips

The **Hurst Where We Live mobile app** allows our residents to identify issues, report them to the City of Hurst, and track the status of their service requests.

Service requests are submitted using a mobile device or our city website, hursttx.gov. You can even include images or videos when submitting your request.

Received service requests automatically route to the appropriate staff member for resolution. Individuals

making a service request will receive a notification when action occurs, keeping the individual informed every step of the way. Additionally, you can access other online city services via the app, such as adoptable pets, pay your utility bill, view the city calendar, and more!

The Hurst Police Department utilizes Police to Citizen (P2C) to share public information with its residents in a central location.

Residents are encouraged to use P2C to report non-emergency incidents, request vacation house checks and enter officer commendations. To access this online resource, please visit hursttx.gov/p2c.

Household garbage and recycling Q&A

The City of Hurst contracts with Republic Services to provide garbage and recycling collection for our residents. A lot of questions come up in regards to garbage service, so we provide a page on our website to answer the most frequent questions we receive. At hursttx.gov/trash, you can find information on garbage service guidelines for bulky objects, tree limbs and brush, container weight limit, and hazardous material. Information on the landfill, including free landfill dates for residents, and the Environmental Collection Center is also available.

Missed service can happen, and when it does, we work with our Republic Services Representative to take care of missed collection as soon as possible. There are two ways you can report missed collection. You can submit a service request through our Where We Live mobile app, and it immediately is received by city staff members through email. You can also call City Hall at 817.788.7000 during regular office hours and speak to someone.

Challenge Coin

Hurst employees honored for excellent leadership during pandemic

A Job Well Done

City of Hurst staff were recently recognized for their servant leadership exhibited during the pandemic, Winter Storm Uri and the operation of the vaccination clinic at the Hurst Conference Center. Each city employee received a challenge coin to commemorate this unique time period and for city leadership to show their appreciation for a job well done.

With the closing of several of our facilities during

the shutdown at the beginning of the pandemic, many of our employees were furloughed. Something we hope we never have to experience again. It was a trying time for many of our departments with so much unknown, and we are grateful to be on the other side of it. All of our first responders, facilities maintenance crews, public works, and many other staff members had to remain on the front lines helping the community and keeping things sanitized when

the risk of contracting COVID-19 was still uncertain.

Many of our employees, like so many people around the world, have gone through losing loved ones to COVID-19. It has impacted everyone not only on a professional level, but more significantly, on a deeply personal level.

Winter Storm Uri wreaked havoc throughout the state of Texas. City staff stepped up during that time to work round the clock to monitor our water tanks and levels and ensure our water remained safe. We are proud to say that because of our water utilities staff and their knowledge and instincts, Hurst was able to avoid a boil water notice.

With everything that our residents were going through at that time, worrying about the safety of their water was not something they had to experience. Because so many people were experiencing power outages, we opened a warming center at our library and also partnered with the cities of Euless and Bedford to open a second warming center at Central Junior High.

A number of those who utilized the warming centers were senior citizens who needed a bit of extra assistance. Some did not have the medication they needed during their stay, so our staff members took note of each person needing medication and was able to get them what they needed by our Fire staff either going into their homes to retrieve their medication or spending hours at the pharmacy getting the medication from their list. Other staff members graciously stepped up as care takers for elderly in ways that go far past what was expected. Humanity was on full display at these warming centers, and we are still in awe of how our employees stepped up to help.

In January 2021, we were presented with the

opportunity to partner with Tarrant County and open the Northeast Tarrant County Vaccination Clinic at the Hurst Conference Center. Our staff members were tasked with coordinating all of the volunteers needed to run the clinic and figuring out logistics in order to open up the clinic within one week. We were able to pull it off thanks to our HR team and Fire emergency management staff. We also relocated staff from other departments to help operate the clinic from January – June, many Hurst employees worked 12 hour days, sometimes six days a week.

These stories just graze the surface of all that our staff members have experienced over the last 20 months, and we are incredibly appreciative of their dedication to the city and our residents. We hope through everything over the last two years you continue to feel proud of the city you live in and know that our team members are working hard behind the scenes to make a difference in our community, no matter what is thrown our way.

ENGINE 203

New fire apparatus brought into service amid push-in ceremony at Station 3

In October, we celebrated the addition of our new fire apparatus, Engine 203, with a push-in ceremony. City council, staff and volunteers helped clean the truck and push it into the bay of Fire Station 3 where it will reside. Engine 203 is quite taller than our previous engines. It is a “heavy duty rescue pumper” which provides a lot more space for tools and equipment. A significant safety feature was also installed on the new engine, the first one ever placed on a Pierce built apparatus in Texas. This feature gives the operator the ability to lower intensity of the emergency warning lights which will prevent drivers from being blinded at night by the warning lights.

All electric tools were purchased for this engine. Historically, the “jaws of life” requires a gasoline power

plant with hydraulic hose plugged into the plant and the tool for operation. Firefighters have to deal with hydraulic fluid leaking when connecting different tools to the hose. These new tools have the hydraulic fluid built into each tool and operate off of a single battery. This design allows for multiple tools to be operating at one time. Firefighters won’t be limited to the length of the hose or power plant, and the tools are portable, creating more usage of the tools.

Because of the addition of our new apparatus, one of our yellow engines, a 2001 reserve engine will be retiring. Engine 203 is going to serve our community well, and we are grateful to add this innovative engine to our fleet.

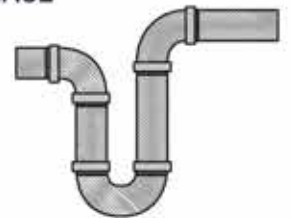

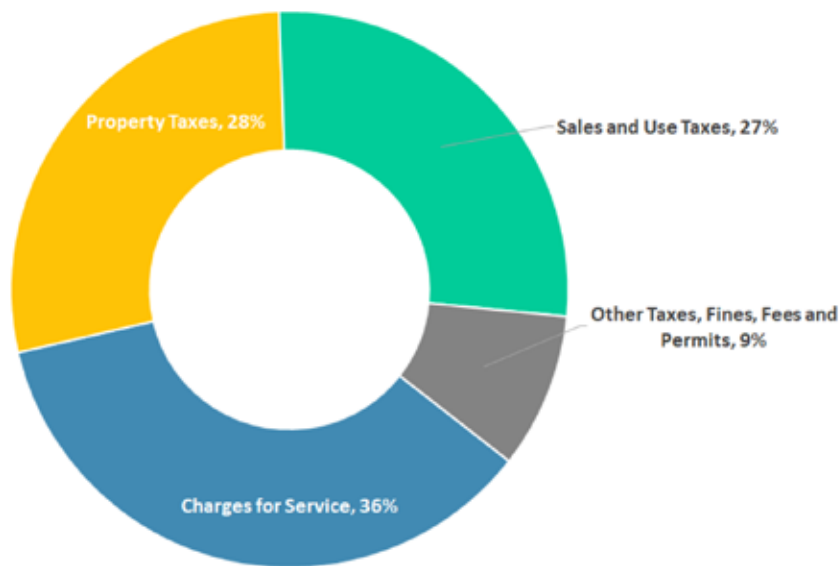

PROPERTY TAX RATE

Property Tax Rate: \$0.625159 per \$100 of Taxable Value

Property Tax Rate remained the same as last year's rate, but due to rising Property Values, and other factors, the City will incur more revenue from the same Tax Rate. This will assist the City as we restore services to pre COVID-19 levels and recover from the previous winter storm.

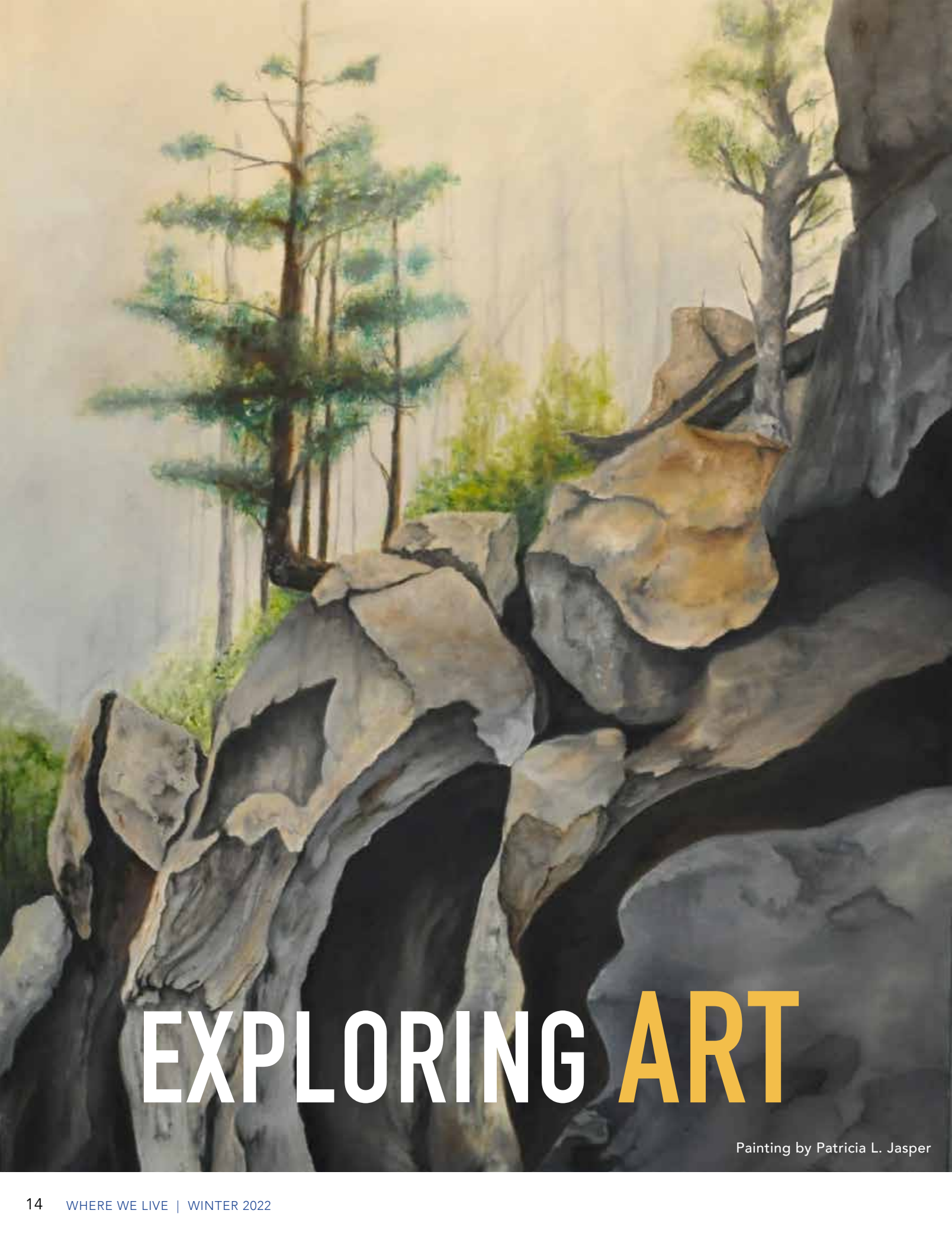
