Background/Analysis:

The City Council approved Ordinance 2260 on August 26, 2014 that established the areas along City streets where parking is prohibited. The proposed addition to that list of street areas is the first 135 feet west along the south side of Redbud Drive from the Brown Trail intersection. This will provide more room for buses and fire trucks to enter and exit this side of the intersection.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

There is no financial impact.

Designation of No Parking areas is directly representative of the Council's goal of **Public Safety**.

Recommendation:

It is recommended City Council approve Ordinance 2535, second reading, amending Chapter 24 by adding a sentence to Section 24-127; prohibiting parking in a certain area on Redbud Drive near Brown Trail.

ORDINANCE 2535

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HURST, TEXAS, AMENDING THE HURST CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 24 BY ADDING TO SECTION 24-127; PROHIBITING PARKING IN CERTAIN AREAS; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

- WHEREAS, the City Council (the "City Council") of the City of Hurst, Texas (the "City"), has appointed a Transportation Infrastructure and Safety Committee to act in an advisory capacity to the City Council in all matters pertaining to traffic safety; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Transportation Infrastructure and Safety Committee has determined, after reasonable consideration, that parking should be prohibited on the streets provided herein; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Hurst is a Home Rule municipality having full powers of self-government and may enact ordinances relative to its citizens' health, safety, and welfare that are not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the State; and
- **WHEREAS,** Section 311.001 of the Texas Transportation Code provides that a home-rule municipality has exclusive control over and under the public highways, streets, and alleys of the municipality; and
- **WHEREAS,** Section 545.302 of the Texas Transportation Code prohibits stopping, standing, or parking in certain areas, including areas where an official sign prohibits stopping, standing, or parking; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Hurst has determined that it is a necessity to regulate activities as provided for herein to safeguard the public; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Hurst is authorized by law to adopt the provisions contained herein, and has complied with all the prerequisites necessary for the passage of this Ordinance; and
- WHEREAS, all statutory and constitutional requirements for the passage of this Ordinance have been adhered to, including but not limited to the Open Meetings Act; and
- **WHEREAS,** the purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of the City of Hurst.

Ordinance 2535 Page 2 of 3

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HURST, TEXAS:

- Section 1. **THAT** the statements contained in the preamble to this Ordinance are hereby adopted as findings of fact and as a part of the operative provisions hereof.
- Section 2. **THAT** the City of Hurst Code of Ordinances Chapter 24 is hereby amended by adding the following sentence to Section 24-127:
 - "Redbud Drive on the south side from Brown Trail to a point one hundred and thirty-five (135) feet west of Brown Trail."
- Section 3. **THAT** all ordinances or any parts thereof in conflict with the terms of this ordinance shall be and hereby are deemed repealed and of no force or effect.
- Section 4. **THAT** any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined an amount not to exceed \$500.
- Section 5. **THAT** if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.
- Section 6. **THAT** the fact that the present ordinances and regulations of the City of Hurst, Texas are inadequate to properly safeguard the health, safety, morals, peace and general welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Hurst, Texas, creates an emergency for the immediate preservation of the public business, property, health, safety and general welfare of the public, which requires that this ordinance shall become effective from and after the date of its passage, and it is accordingly so ordained.

	City Manager Review:

Background/Analysis:

The Council awarded the bid for the 2022 Miscellaneous Water Main Replacements project to Excel 4 Construction, LLC, on February 28, 2023, for a total amount of \$1,743,702.00 with a \$56,298.00 contingency. Excel 4 Construction, LLC, has done work for the City in the past on water mains and sanitary sewer mains. The change order covers relocating a sewer manhole at the northeast corner of the Bedford-Euless Road bridge over Lorean Branch just east of the Precinct Line Road intersection. This is a utility adjustment the TXDOT staff is requiring before they will advertise and bid the bridge reconstruction project designed for this bridge. City Council approved Resolution 1737 on July 9, 2019 agreeing to the state coordinating the design and reconstruction of this bridge, at basically no cost to the City, except for relocating this manhole. Staff is recommending the attached Change Order 1 be approved to relocate the existing sewer manhole further north away from the proposed bridge location. The cost for this change order is \$42,655.00.

Funding and Sources and Community Sustainability:

Sufficient funding for Change Order 1 is available in the project contingency funds.

Undertaking these infrastructure improvements is directly representative of the Council's goals of *Financial Sustainability* and *Infrastructure*. The use of federal and state grant funds is financially prudent.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council authorize the city manager to execute Change Order 1, with Excel 4 Construction, LLC, in the amount of \$42,655.00, for the 2022 Miscellaneous Water Main Replacement Project.



Background/Analysis:

The City of Hurst contracts with Allied Waste Services, Inc., dba Republic Services of Fort Worth (Republic Services), for the exclusive collection and disposal of residential, commercial, and industrial trash and residential recycling. This contract was competitively bid and awarded to Republic Services in 2003 and has been extended at various points over the last 20 years. The current contract began in June 2018 for a five-year period with renewal options. Based on an analysis of the market, citizen survey results, and that Republic Services continues to be a valued community partner, staff supports their proposed contract renewal.

Republic Services proposes an updated Contract for renewal that includes changes to their current business model including the following provisions:

- Proposed agreement includes a 7 year term
- Maintain current service levels, with rate adjustment, until year-end of 2025
- At year-end 2025, Republic will convert to automated side load (ASL) service requiring the use of residential polycarts
- The city has the option to provide polycart services beginning in 2025 as a once a week or twice a week service
- Customers will have the option to pay for an additional cart regardless of the number of times residential service occurs in a week
- Adjust the annual rate increase from 3% to 4% with the first rate adjustment November 1, 2023
- Include a one-time rate increase of 6% in conversion year then revert to a 4% increase

- Maintain bulk collection services
- Maintain back door services

Hurst will not be the first City in Tarrant County to transition to residential polycart services. Several cities currently operate residential polycart service; however, industry trends and market forces are driving solid waste haulers in the area to begin converting to polycart residential services. Republic Services will be converting the City of Arlington to polycarts beginning on July 1, 2024. Republic Services representatives have also assured staff the mid-cities area will all convert to polycarts at approximately the same time.

The waste industry has been converting to polycarts for many years. Republic Services currently utilizes polycarts in approximately 90% of their service area. Solid waste haulers also struggle to attract and retain enough workers to manually collect trash. This job is extremely physical, the workers are exposed to extreme heat and cold, and the safety risks makes these jobs less desirable than other less physically demanding jobs that pay approximately the same.

Polycarts also aid in protecting the aesthetics of the City by keeping waste contained in a leak-proof cart and decreasing the animal and windblown litter throughout the neighborhoods.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

There is no fiscal impact. The Contract with Republic Services of Fort Worth ensures we **best meet the needs of the community in a financially responsible manner** in support of **the Hurst Way**.

Recommendation:

Background/Analysis:

The City's current bank depository services contract with Wells Fargo will expire on July 31, 2023. A Request for Application (RFA) was distributed on January 30, 2023, and the City hosted a pre-application conference on February 6, 2023. By the March 9, 2023 deadline, the City received applications from two financial institutions – Wells Fargo (current depository bank) and American National Bank of Texas.

The City engaged Valley View Consulting, LLC, to assist in evaluating the applications. We used the following criteria in reviewing the applications:

- 1. Ability to perform and provide the required and requested services.
- 2. References provided and quality of services;
- 3. Cost of services;
- 4. Transition cost, retention and transition offers and incentives;
- 5. Interest rates on interest bearing accounts and deposits;
- 6. Earnings credit rate on compensating balances;
- 7. Previous service relationship with the City;
- 8. Convenience of location(s);
- 9. Completeness of application; and
- 10. Financial strength and stability of institution.

The banking relationship is a critical component of the City's financial operations and Wells Fargo Bank has demonstrated over the last five years that they have the ability to provide the services the City requires in an efficient and effective manner; they have also submitted an application that is the most advantageous to the City, in terms of overall ability to service the City at the most reasonable bottom-line cost.

Based on the strength of their proposal and our established relationship, we recommend the City Council authorize the city manager to enter into a Contract with Wells Fargo for bank depository services for the period beginning August 1, 2023 and ending July 31, 2025, with the option to renew for three additional one-year periods.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Transportation Alternative Grant Program is designed to support the development and construction of non-motorized transportation networks. In November 2022, the City applied and, in March 2023, was selected to move forward into a more thorough review process. A public hearing was conducted on May 10, 2022, at the regular City Council meeting to consider application of CDBG – CV funds for the construction of this water system improvement. No public comments were received pursuant to the hearing. This water line primarily serves the areas immediately adjacent to Brown Trail. Some of the area is retail commercial, but the majority of the area surrounding Brown Trail is used as single and multi-family residential.

Bids were received and opened by Tarrant County on March 29, 2023. Of the two responsive bids received, 2R Construction Services, LLC, submitted the lowest bid of \$594,752.15, with a construction time of 120 calendar days. The CDBG-CV-Round 3 Grant will provide \$200,000 leaving a remainder of \$394,752.15 for the City to reimburse the County. A 10% contingency of \$59,247.85 is not included in the bid amount, but is recommended to be approved as part of this action item. Tarrant County requires the City to approve funding for the project above the grant amount and recommend the award of bid.

Funding and Sources and Community Sustainability:

Sufficient funds are available in Water Depreciation funds.


Undertaking these infrastructure improvements is directly representative of the Council's goals of *Financial Sustainability* and *Infrastructure*. The use of Federal CDBG grant funds through the County is financially prudent and use of City operating funds supports neighborhood sustainability through capital investment in the city water system infrastructure.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the City Council recommend Tarrant County award the contract for the CDBG – CV Round 3: Brown Trail Water Main Replacement, from Pipeline Road to Redbud Drive, to 2R Construction Services, LLC, in the amount of \$594,752.15 with a 10% contingency of \$59,247.85, for a total of \$654,000.00 with the City being responsible for all project costs over the County CDBG grant amount of \$200,000.

On March 29, 2023, two (2) bids were received for the Brown Trail Water Main Replacement CDBG-CV Round 3 project. The bids were opened at the Community Development Division offices at 2501 Parkview Drive, Suite 420, in Ft. Worth. The bids were checked to ensure that all the forms had been properly executed by the bidders. The bids ranged from a low of \$594,752.15 from 2R Construction Services, LLC of Wylie, Texas to a high of \$698,335.00 submitted by Moss Utilities, LLC of Dallas, Texas.

This office reviewed each bid for correct addition and extension of values. No errors were found which adversely affected the order of the bids received. The apparent low responsible bid is from 2R Construction Services, LLC. They have successfully completed several utility projects in this area for public and private entities.

The contractor will provide the necessary bonding and insurance as required in the contract documents. Based upon the references, bonding, and insurance, this office did not find a reason to not award the construction contract for the CDBG-CV ROUND 3: BROWN TRAIL WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT (FROM PIPELINE ROAD TO REDBUD DRIVE) 46TH YEAR COMMUNITY BLOCK GRANT - COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT # B-20-UC-48-0001-36-15 to 2R Construction Services, LLC. for the amount of \$594,752.15.

As with previous CDBG projects, the City of Hurst will be required by the Community Development Division of Tarrant County to pass a resolution awarding the contract to 2R Construction Services, LLC. for the 46TH YEAR COMMUNITY BLOCK GRANT - COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT # B-20-UC-48-0001-36-15 in the amount of \$594,752.15.

Background/Analysis:

Over the past several years, the Brookside Center has transitioned from a subsidized rental facility to a support facility primarily utilized as the City's central voting location, employee training facility, and hosting various recreation-sponsored programs.

Unfortunately, since 2019 the facility has been experiencing intermittent leaks throughout the building. In 2022, after numerous attempts to patch the roof, staff partnered with an engineering firm, The Chadwell Group, LP., to conduct an investigative thermal imaging and infrared analysis. These results determined that after approximately twenty-five years, the roof system and window sealants are beyond the point of patching and require replacement. This discovery led to the development of design plans and construction documents for a complete roof replacement, removal and replacement of the window sealant, and replacement of waterproofing components throughout the building.

Staff sought out bids for repairs using approved purchasing consortium vendors that allow the City to purchase goods and services under a competitive contract quickly and efficiently. Staff recommends using Supreme Roofing for the roof system and window sealant replacement and Falkenberg Construction Company, Inc. to make minor cosmetic repairs. Both companies submitted quotes for a total amount of \$200,620 (including a 10% contingency) for the repairs. They both have an excellent reputation for quality work and have successfully completed similar projects, including the Hurst Recreation Center and City Hall.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

The total project amount, including a 10% contingency, is \$200,620 and has been identified in the Special Projects Fund.

In an effort to remain a vibrant community, this project addresses the City Council's Strategic Priorities for **Infrastructure**, **Public Safety**, **and Leadership** by maintaining the Brookside Center.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council authorize the city manager to enter into the appropriate agreements to proceed with the Brookside Center Roof Replacement Project, for an amount not to exceed \$200,620.

Background/Analysis:

In 2002, the City held its first "Hurst Stars & Stripes" July 4th celebration at the Hurst Community Park. This family-oriented event features live musical entertainment and food vendors, and the finale of the five-hour event is a spectacular fireworks show. The fireworks show has proven to be one of the most popular components of the annual event. Over 15,000 people attend the Hurst Stars & Stripes event within the park's boundaries. Additionally, the annual Tree Lighting event draws in over 5,000 visitors in three hours, and the fireworks show plays a large part in helping Santa kick off the Christmas season with a bang.

The artistic elements of a pyrotechnic show involve the fireworks portion and a carefully choreographed musical soundtrack played during the performances. This choreography requires the selected company to work closely with the City's Event Resource Committee and AV Vendor to review the song selections, musical choreography, firing patterns, and visual effects.

Staff updated a set of specifications to meet the City's expectations with the intent to establish an annual, renewable agreement with a qualified contractor. The City advertised and distributed the bid documents to pyrotechnic businesses. After a full review, staff determined that Pyro Shows of Texas, Inc. is the qualified bidder. Pyro Shows of Texas, Inc. has an excellent reputation working with the City and within the industry for delivering unique and dynamic firework shows.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

The Recreation Division will spend approximately \$55,000 annually for this service. Funding is available in the Recreation Division FY22-23 operating budget and Special Projects Fund.

In an effort to remain a vibrant community, this project addresses the City Council's Strategic Priorities for **Innovation**, **Economic Vitality**, **and Leadership** by hosting excellent special events.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council authorize the city manager to enter into a Contract with Pyro Shows of Texas, Inc. for pyrotechnic services with the option to renew annually.

Background/Analysis:

The City of Hurst currently utilizes various types of fencing throughout all City-owned locations. Most fencing requirements are for the athletic field fences within the Athletic Complex, Community Park, and Chisholm Park. The Parks Division monitors, maintains, and improves these fences to ensure they function properly and provide security and safety for our citizens and patrons.

In January 2007, the Parks Division began contracting out the maintenance, rental, and installation of fences throughout City-owned locations. The most recent contract expires in May 2023. Staff modified a set of specifications and bid documents to meet the City's current fencing needs. The City advertised and distributed bid documents to fencing businesses in the area, with one company responding. After a full review, staff determined Latham Fence, Inc. meets the requirements. Latham Fence, Inc. has a reputation for quality and timely workmanship.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

The Parks Division is estimated to require approximately \$60,000 per year to complete the necessary fencing work required throughout City-owned locations. Funding for this contract has been identified in the FY 2022-23 Operating and Project budgets.

In an effort to remain a vibrant community, this contract addresses the City Council's Strategic Priorities for **Redevelopment** and **Infrastructure** by maintaining and improving the City's parks and facilities.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council authorize the city manager to enter into an Annual Contract with Latham Fence, Inc. for fence repair, rental, and construction services throughout the City, with an option for four additional twelve-month renewals.

Background/Analysis:

The Fleet Services Division is committed to maintaining, repairing, and replacing City vehicles and equipment in a timely and cost-effective manner to prevent interruptions in City services. The Fleet Services Division follows a replacement schedule to determine vehicle and equipment depreciation and estimate service life. All parts, fuel, and repairs are tracked during the service life of the vehicle or equipment. Each year during the budget process, all vehicles and equipment are evaluated based on age, mileage, maintenance, and repair costs. Following this evaluation process, the necessary vehicles and equipment are budgeted to be replaced in the upcoming fiscal year. After vehicles are approved for replacement, Fleet Services staff examines them to determine if any equipment can be reused and lower cost.

For Fiscal Year 2023, one 14' type 1 ambulance module is scheduled to be replaced. This new ambulance would replace the oldest reserve ambulance, and one ambulance would be moved from front-line use to the reserve fleet. Council approved the purchase of this ambulance in December 2022, in the amount of \$279,685. However, staff was not able to purchase it due to shortages at Ford Motor Co. Recently, an International chassis however has become available in the amount of \$289,928, an increase of \$10,243.

Frazer/Rush Truck Centers submitted a quote, in the amount of \$289,928.00 (price includes \$25,500 trade-in credit), for an International CV515 Ambulance. The City of Hurst is a member of the HGAC consortium, which provides substantial cost savings for purchasing vehicles and equipment. When making purchases through the HGAC contract, the City can purchase directly from Frazer/Rush Truck Centers as a low bidder. Additional budgeted funds may be used to purchase and install the necessary equipment after examinations to determine what can be reused from the existing units. This equipment and vehicle decaling will be purchased following City standard purchasing policies and procedures.

Funding Sources and Community Sustainability:

Funding for these units has been identified within the Fiscal Year 2023 Fleet Service Fund. The fleet replacement schedule is designed to be **fiscally responsible** while at the same time providing **excellent service**.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends City Council authorize the city manager to purchase (1) one ambulance from approved vendors, in the amount of \$289,928.
