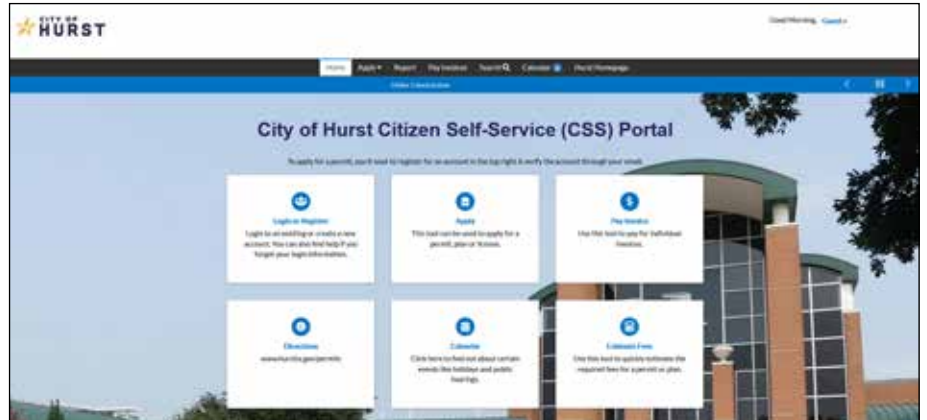

New Online Self-Service Permitting and Planning

We will soon be launching a new EnerGov™ Citizen Self-Service (CSS) Portal that will allow customers to submit building permitting and development applications, pay fees, check the status of applications, view inspections, and complete a host of additional Planning and Development Services related business processes with the City.

Once the system is in place, customers will visit hursttx.gov/css and create a login profile to register. The EnerGov™ Citizen Self-Service portal will guide users step by step through the application process online, allow them to submit necessary documentation and pay fees associated with their submittal, and manage multiple applications in one online destination. The system will automatically route materials to the proper City departments for review and allow the applicant to track the progress of their submittal. Along with the ability to apply and manage submittals, the ability to make online payments eliminates the need to mail in or deliver checks or other documentation in person.

As part of city council's strategic priority, Innovation, EnerGov™ will allow staff to enhance efficiency while focusing on process improvement and customer service. The system is scheduled to launch this January.

Citizen survey to open early 2021

Each year, the City of Hurst engages in our Strategic Planning Process to determine priorities for the upcoming budget. This process allows the city council to evaluate community needs and assess their impact on the city's budget while also helping the city determine which services to provide and at what level they are offered. One critical factor that affects the strategic planning process is our annual citizen survey.

We will open up our survey for responses after the first of the year. When the survey is open, we will notify residents through our website, social media and waterbill inserts. You'll be able to access it during that time by visiting hursttx.gov/citizensurvey. Once

the survey is closed, staff and council will evaluate how responses have changed over the past year to effectively develop a strategic plan to guide the budget process. These survey results are direct feedback and information that is critical to developing council's priorities that staff uses to develop the proposed budget.

We are excited about the opportunity to continue to provide high quality services to our citizens. We sincerely appreciate all who have responded to our surveys now and in the past. The responses we receive help us develop a budget that meets the needs of our community today and tomorrow.

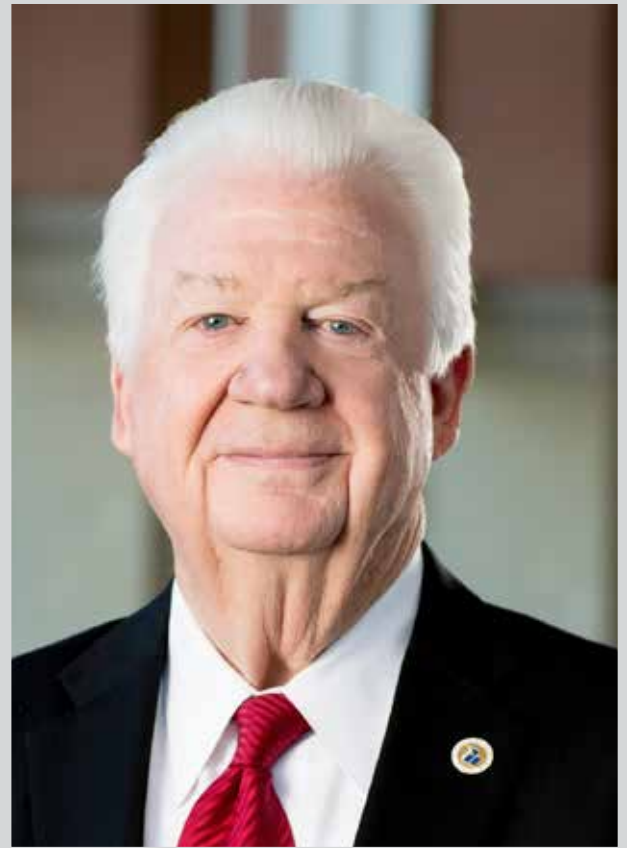
COUNCILMEMBER BILL McLENDON RETIRES



Councilmember Bill McLendon is retiring from Hurst City Council after 40 years of service to the City. He grew up in Fort Worth and has been a resident of Hurst, along with his wife Norma, for forty-seven years. He was appointed to the Parks and Recreation Board in 1980 and served until appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission in 1991. Councilmember McLendon was elected to City Council and served from 2000 to 2020, including service on the Crime Control District Board of Directors and Community Service Development Corporation. He also served on the Regional Transportation Council for seven years, the HEB Chamber Economic Development Foundation for 16 years and was a Special Olympics golf partner for six years, participating in local and state tournaments.

During his service as Councilmember, Hurst experienced continued economic development, redevelopment and revitalization, including numerous projects, such as the Hurst Conference Center, Hurst Senior Center, Fire Station 2, Hurst Justice Center, Hurst Chisholm and Central Aquatic Centers, Animal Services and Adoption facilities, along with other major public facilities and improvements.

SENIOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

Leasing to begin in 2021

Gala at Central Park is proposed to be a 94 unit, class A constructed community for independent senior living (ages 55+) located at 309 W. Pipeline Road in the City of Hurst, TX. Comprised of 1 and 2 bedrooms, Gala at Central Park will be a Class A constructed community designed in a distinctly upscale aesthetic with an amenity package that rivals the best senior housing in North Texas. This high quality senior housing will intentionally be situated to serve seniors of all incomes including the many seniors living on fixed incomes. The building will have elevators to serve seniors well, and the whole property will have full perimeter fencing with access control gates to get into the parking areas.

Amenities:

- Resort style pool
- Furnished fitness center with senior appropriate equipment
- Business Center
- Fully appointed clubhouse with community room, free common area Wi-Fi and coffee bar
- Arts & Crafts room
- Barbeque grills and picnic areas

Construction will begin late 2020, and leasing will be available starting in late 2021. We are excited this new development is coming to Hurst to offer seniors an exceptional place to live!

Budget Summary FY 2021

Using the vision, mission and values as a guide, the council established their strategic priorities. These priorities provide a direction for city staff in planning and evaluating their daily actions. The priorities allow staff to have clear direction and focus areas to ensure we are able to achieve the mission and vision.



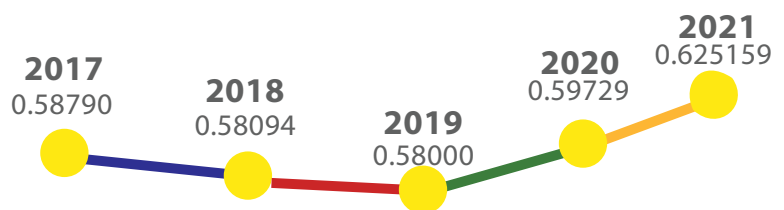
- Redevelopment agreements** supporting the arts and Hurst shopping centers. Continued redevelopment support at North East Mall.
- Replacement of EMS vehicle**, replacement of PD equipment and associated training, construction of voter approved animal shelter.
- Investment in leadership training**, supervisory skills, and employee orientation focused on the strategic plan.
- Critical software updates and enhancements** including permitting, work order management, and SCADA controls.
- Active management of debt portfolio**, conservative budget approach, agreement with new auditing firm.
- Bonds issued for reconstruction** of critical roadways and targeted reinvestment in water, wastewater, and storm drainage infrastructure.

Tax Rate

The City Council has worked to be responsive to our community when adopting a tax rate. After a few years of decline in the tax rate, the City Council increased the tax rate for FY 2020 to fund voter approved bonds and fund other community priorities. The tax rate was also increased in FY 2021 to help maintain service levels while mitigating the effects of the pandemic and address financial needs resulting from state mandates.

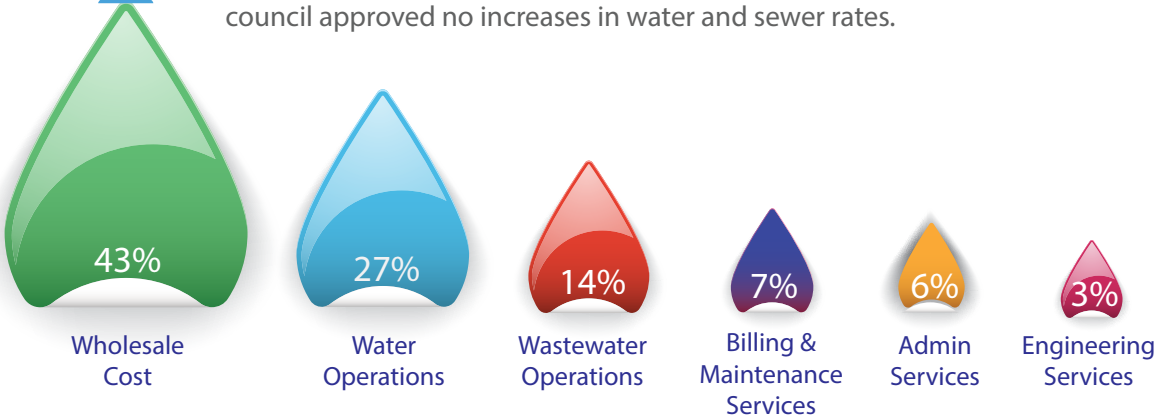
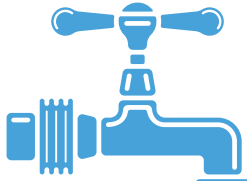
Five year history

(By FY)



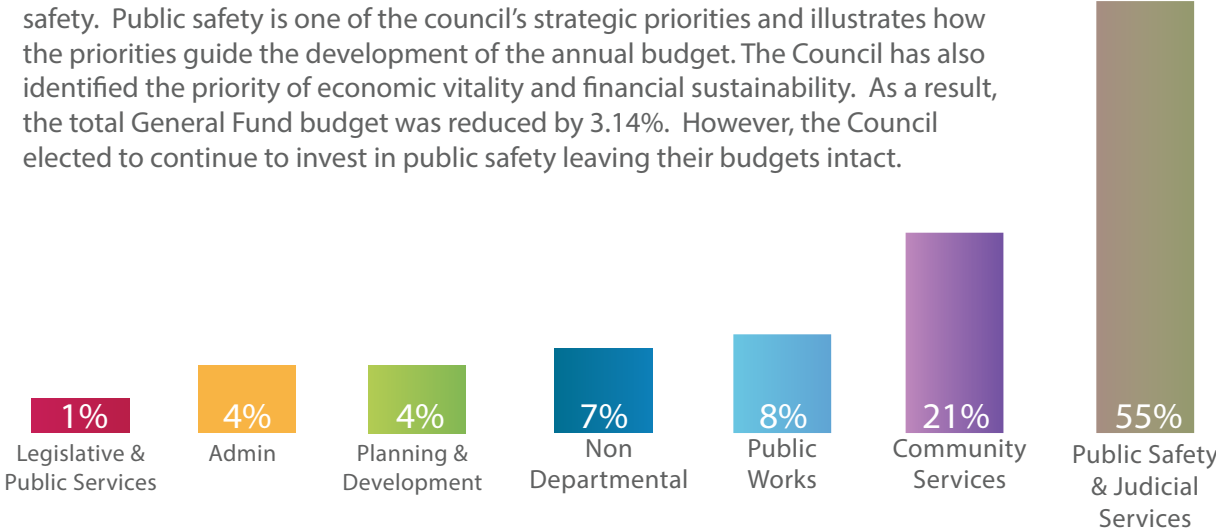
Enterprise Fund Expenditures

The enterprise fund tracks revenues and expenditures related to providing water and wastewater services to our community. Each year, we conduct an in depth analysis of consumption patterns, wholesale costs, financial obligations, infrastructure condition, and operational costs to determine the rates necessary to continue to provide safe water and sanitary sewer services. You can see that wholesale costs represent the greatest share of costs in the enterprise fund. This includes a wholesale cost increase that covers treatment of water and delivery by the City of Fort Worth and Trinity River Authority. Council follows a policy of passing through wholesale increases to the customers. For FY 2021, the council approved no increases in water and sewer rates.



General Fund Tax Expenditures

The general fund tracks the revenues and expenditures associated with general purpose property and sales taxes collected by the city. As is typical with most cities, just over half our expenditures in the general fund are related to public safety. Public safety is one of the council’s strategic priorities and illustrates how the priorities guide the development of the annual budget. The Council has also identified the priority of economic vitality and financial sustainability. As a result, the total General Fund budget was reduced by 3.14%. However, the Council elected to continue to invest in public safety leaving their budgets intact.

HURST ANIMAL SERVICES

Construction in progress on new facility supported by voter approved bond funding

Structural steel framing has been completed for the new Animal Services and Adoption Center located off TCC Rd.

In May 2019, voters approved a bond to support a new Animal Services and Adoption Center that will be located off of TCC Rd. This will fund the design and construction of the building which will enhance the capability for animal care and processing adoptions. The new building will also provide space for potential adopters to interact with their favorite animal, and space will allow for animal exercise, medical procedures and secure intake of animals. Updated design features will allow for better sanitation, reduced noise (barking levels), ventilation and use of technology.

Construction of the Animal Services and Adoption Center began in April 2020. The city postponed several other capital projects due to COVID-19's economic impact. But, voters approved funding for the Animal

Services and Adoption Center, and that funding may only be used for that purpose.

As of the end of November, underground utilities have been installed, site concrete paving is 50% complete, building pad and structural steel framing is complete, exterior framing has started, roof deck installation has started and exterior brick installation has started.

By the end of 2020, interior wall framing, electrical, mechanical and plumbing and exterior brick installation will be nearly complete. The roofing is scheduled to be complete, and doors and window installation will begin. The project is moving along well, and we continue to stay on schedule with a projected completion date of Summer 2021!
